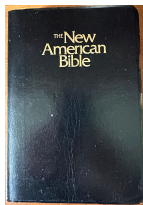

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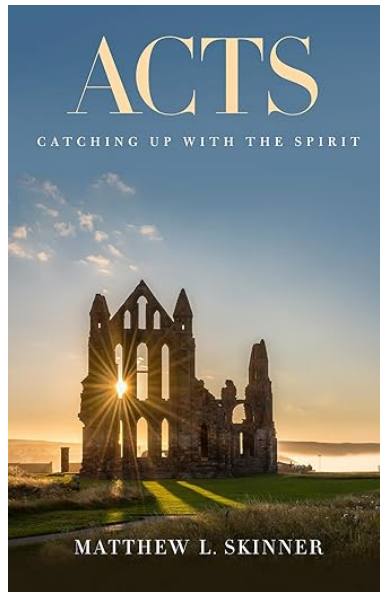

Happy New year everyone and time for a fresh start. Many of us will make New Year's resolutions and often for Christians it is to read the entire Bible from cover to cover. That is an awesome task and I would say for most a nearly impossible thing to do if you decide to read the Bible as one would read a novel, which is something I would not recommend you try. Most people who do this will find themselves getting bogged down somewhere around the book of Leviticus and pretty much give up.

So how do we read this massive work and try to find meaning and connection to God? If you are not already familiar with the scriptures, I would strongly suggest finding a good reading plan that offers guidance and context for what you are reading. I have found the The Bible Project to be a good resource. For those of you who have access to the internet The Bible Project offers a number of "Read the Bible in One Year" plans that are free. If you are interested here is a link to the site: <https://bibleproject.com/reading-plans/>.

One last thing to consider. The Bible, especially the Old Testament is Jewish mediation literature that contains history, poetry, wisdom, miracles but most importantly the story of God and His creation. Don't just read the words, but rather take some time to sit with them to see what God is saying to you. Listen or in ancient Hebrew, Shema with your heart as God speaks to you.
